
Some day, no doubt, when censorship permits, we will be able to present a more complete picture of the everyday activities of a Wilderness Air Base.

In the U.S.O. Building, dancing is possible at all times, through a well equipped Juke Box. Military personnel from all over the island, supply band and orchestra music from time to time.


